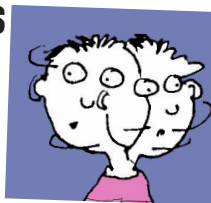

Sky News is doing something different, to create a change. They have launched Stand Up Be Counted - to help give young people a voice, ahead of the General Election on 7th May 2015.

Young people are invited to upload a short clip, talking on camera about a subject for which they have a great passion. The Stand Up site is already a showcase for creative, absorbing and sometimes entertaining debate from 16 to 25-year-olds in their bedrooms, back gardens or high street, talking about the things that matter to them. Short videos - ideally around 60 seconds - blogs and photos are all welcome on one condition - they have to come from the heart.

And it's safe to speak openly, and powerfully. This is a place for robust debate, with zero tolerance for abuse, so points can be made freely knowing that, as well as starting conversations with peers, there is also access to Sky News' audience and, crucially, those in power who have found it all too easy to ignore the views of young people.

## Three cheers for the British Dyslexia Association (BDA), the SpLD Trust and Lord Addington

Lord Addington persistently fought for the government to make clear what support could be provided for dyslexic students studying functional skills on apprenticeship courses. Often these students fall through cracks between Government departments and between employers and training providers. Now a fact sheet has been produced, with input from staff at the British Dyslexia Association and the SpLD Trust. The factsheet outlines the support available for functional skills and key skills qualifications that have to be taken as part of an apprenticeship. This includes the access arrangements and assistive technologies available for courses and exams, and how they can be requested. It also explains how to retake qualifications that may have been failed in the past, to be able to complete an apprenticeship.

## Accessible Formats for School Textbooks

Load2Learn now have over 40 publishers supplying electronic files for their educational textbooks. They convert the books to accessible formats in Word for easy use of user display preferences and for Text to Speech software.

Load2Learn membership now includes Further and Higher Education establishments, as well as schools. The service is Government funded, free in UK and available to overseas schools for £150 ex VAT. Members can download any files of books for which they have print copies.

## Apprenticeships for Instructors

## Digital Degree Apprenticeships

New government and industry-backed digital qualifications will provide the skills for a wide range of digital jobs, helping to fill the one million vacancies expected in the digital sector in the next decade. Degree Apprenticeships will allow young people to complete a full honours degree alongside their employment while paying no student fees and earning a wage throughout. The government will pay two-thirds of the costs and fees while employers pay trainees' wages and other costs. Employers of any size can take part in the scheme

The first Degree Apprenticeships are to be launched in the digital sector, and are expected to suit people embarking on careers ranging from business analysis to software development and technology consultancy. The new programme includes a fully-integrated degree testing both academic learning and on-the-job practical training, and has been co-created by leading tech employers and top universities.

There will also be new industry-designed short courses to enhance digital skills across the workforce. The short courses will provide intensive training, with content that keeps pace with employers' immediate needs and changing technologies, and will be delivered flexibly to suit learners' needs. The new industry-accredited standard will give small businesses up and down the country the confidence to know that they can hire digital professionals with the skills they need.

You can also see just what subject changes have been made for Years 7 to 12; a small number of qualifications will be withdrawn and some will be replaced by reformed qualifications.
